At Home in Tay Valley weaves together the history of the Algonquin, the arrival of the first settlers in 1816, their economic and community life, and the 20th century arrivals: the cottagers, campers and back-to-the landers. The result: an anthology richly illustrated with maps, paintings and photographs, plus the tales, family recollections and special memories of those who know it best – the people of Tay Valley.
